ITF women are also working to develop a mentoring scheme for transport women activists. This initiative will provide support to women activists who would like to accelerate progress on the women's agenda in their union. It will also provide experienced women leaders with the opportunity to support the next generation of women leaders.

• Engage workers, the public and the media on key issues for women














- Celebrate progress and women's activism
